The OASIS program offers support to families experiencing homelessness. It includes an Emergency Family Shelter and a Daytime Drop-In Center, which provides food, supplies, and laundry facilities. The program also offers case management services to help families identify and overcome the challenges that led to their homelessness. Case managers work closely with each family to create personalized plans focused on finding permanent housing, increasing income, and accessing community resources. This comprehensive approach aims to break the cycle of homelessness and empower families to create brighter futures.

Torn from their country in crisis, today they're our neighbors, friends, and colleagues, resettling in our community from Syria, Afghanistan, Ukraine, Guatemala, Venezuela, Myanmar, Democratic Republic of the Congo, and Mexico, thanks to the diligent work of CCS's Refugee & Immigrant Services Program (RISP) and dedicated volunteers of the Refugee Resettlement Coalition of Lane County (RRC).

RISP is the only full affiliate refugee resettlement agency in Lane County, supporting over 50 new arrivals this year with immigration legal services and a full host of holistic services including case management, employment services, housing and home furnishing support, English classes and other educational connections, and resources for childcare, healthcare and other necessities to help refugees and immigrants navigate the complexities of starting a new life in an unfamiliar place and becoming self-sufficient, active participants in our community.

Will You Help?

Food insecurity in our community is on the rise, exacerbated by the recent closing of two previously available food pantries in Eugene, the rising cost and shortage of food nationally, climate change, and many other components of a complex economy. As the largest distributor of free food in Lane County, CCS is feeling this rising need. During the past three months alone, March/April/May 2024, our Agency distributed **9,239** food boxes to neighbors in need.

We are so grateful to our longtime partner, **FOOD For Lane County**, and our recent collaboration with **The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints**, who supply most of the food to our two pantries in Eugene and Springfield.

We also greatly appreciate our pantry team of staff and volunteers who show up every day to ensure food is on the table for thousands in our community.

We encourage additional community support and urge those who can help to please do so. Whether it's monetary support to CCS to purchase additional food and fresh produce, a donation of non-perishable food items, or volunteering your time in one of our two food pantries, every act of generosity helps in the fight against hunger. Let's work together so that no one in our community goes without this basic human necessity.

Clothing = Dignity, Respect, and for many, Employment

CCS's free Clothing Closet is a godsend for many who visit our Springfield Community Service Center, helping stretch personal and family budgets as far as possible. In the past year, from May 2023-May 2024, 8,465 visits were made to the Clothing Closet and 41,000 pieces of clothing were distributed.

Doors are open Monday-Friday from 9 a.m. to noon, for this great FREE resource!

Always in short supply are men's casual street clothes, new socks, new undergarments for men and women, and belts.

Drop off donations in Springfield only M-F 9 a.m. to noon, in the alley off 10th Street, at the Clothing Closet entrance. Please do not drop donations at the Springfield Community Service Center main desk.

The Eugene Service Center does not accept donations. We do not sell clothing donations, we offer them back to the needy in our community at no-cost!
